## **MAIN PART**

The role, essence, and functions of the public relations system in political party activities are fundamental for ensuring the party's influence, social legitimacy, and political relevance. Public relations is a key component of the modern political communication system, serving as a strategic tool for organizing, strengthening, and managing the interaction between political parties and the public.

PR functions not only as a means of informing society but also as a mechanism for promoting party values, ensuring continuous engagement with voters, managing dissent, and maintaining transparency in party activities. Through an effective PR system, political parties communicate efficiently with their electorate, study their needs and demands, and adapt their political programs to align with societal interests.

According to political communication theory, the effective use of PR tools enables political parties to reinforce communication with state institutions, non-governmental organizations, the mass media, and civil society structures. Additionally, it strengthens a party's social legitimacy, public reputation, and stable communication with voters.

PR activities extend far beyond information dissemination; they serve as a means of shaping and influencing public opinion. This system helps create a positive perception of the party's activities, consolidate its public image, and secure advantages within a competitive political environment. Effective PR tools also foster constructive communication between political parties and various social institutions, enabling parties to identify societal issues, respond to them, and propose appropriate political solutions. Furthermore, strong public relations practices play a strategic role in shaping the external image of a political party and act as a decisive factor in its long-term development.

From this perspective, the public relations system represents an integral component of political party activity. In modern democratic conditions, PR serves as a key mechanism for strengthening party–society relations, ensuring openness and active communication, and thereby earning and maintaining public trust.

Article 74 of the Constitution of the Republic of Uzbekistan states: “*Political parties express the political will of various social strata and groups, and participate in the formation of state power through their democratically elected representatives.*” As defined in the country’s Fundamental Law, political parties may freely participate in expressing the political will of different social groups and in forming state power through their representatives without any restrictions.

In recent years, the legal basis for the development of public relations in Uzbekistan has significantly strengthened. A Presidential decision established comprehensive guarantees for creating favorable conditions for the effective functioning of mass media, ensuring high-quality communication between the state and society, delivering timely, unbiased, and complete information about the goals, tasks, and outcomes of reforms, increasing the transparency of state and economic administration bodies, and improving their cooperation with the public. This decision has become highly beneficial not only for specialists in information policy but also for public relations (PR) practitioners.

The core functions of PR—information dissemination, advocacy, shaping public opinion, and consolidating political support—directly influence the credibility and effectiveness of a political actor in the eyes of the electorate. At the same time, a merely formal approach to these tasks, without analyzing the needs and expectations of the target audience, can seriously undermine a party’s public standing.

Practical experience shows that some political parties and organizations tend to use PR tools superficially, in a standardized manner, without organizing them strategically and systematically. Such an approach may lead to distrust, indifference, or even resistance among the public. As a result, political communication between the party and voters weakens, creating a disconnect that undermines trust in the party and diminishes its authority as a political institution. Without a well-established system of effective PR tools and communication methods, it becomes difficult for a party to recover from such setbacks.

Public relations (PR) is a complex socio-communicative process and a strategic, institutional component of modern communication management. It performs tasks such as building mutually beneficial relations between social actors, strengthening social integration, and increasing an organization’s social capital within the information and communication environment. In the 21st century, PR has become an integral part of political party activities, shaping their strategic positioning, facilitating communication with the electorate, and promoting party ideas within the broader social environment. Contemporary democratic processes show that political parties increasingly monitor public opinion, analyze it, and, based on these insights, adjust their political platforms, programs, and rhetorical strategies.

This trend indicates that political parties now regard factors such as the public’s socio-psychological condition, needs and expectations, civic discipline, and level of social activity as central criteria in strategic planning and communicative action. Consequently, the PR system is required to function as a mediative platform between political institutions and civil society.

British PR expert Sam Black, who gained international recognition for organizing 262 exhibitions and more than 100 conferences during his half-century career in public relations, thoroughly explained the essence of PR in his famous book “*What is Public Relations?*” The book elaborates on communication etiquette in professional relationships, ethical standards of conduct, and effective interaction with the media, government agencies, and industrial and commercial sectors. It also discusses how to design a corporate style, present it using modern printing technologies, organize exhibitions or fairs, and effectively implement advertising activities.

Analysis of international political practice demonstrates that strengthening institutional, strategic, and media-communicative relations between political parties, the mass media, and the wider public is one of the decisive factors ensuring their political legitimacy, electoral competitiveness,

and societal influence. In the modern political environment, parties function not only as political institutions but also as active media actors that shape public opinion. Maintaining such a position and consistently enhancing it has become one of the key strategic objectives of any political party. This, in turn, requires building a stable socio-political foundation based on citizens' trust and support. Strengthening the public relations (PR) system and organizing it on new, modern principles is therefore of particular importance as one of the most essential directions of party activity.

Indeed, through effective public relations, a political party can gain a deeper understanding of social realities, study the needs and problems of the population, and respond to them appropriately. This process increases the party's social influence, fosters open communication and cooperation based on mutual trust, and contributes to a favorable public environment. The Resolution of the Cabinet of Ministers of the Republic of Uzbekistan "*On Measures to Further Improve the Activities of Information Services of State and Economic Administration Bodies*" dated February 15, 2018, places special emphasis on improving the effectiveness of information services, increasing the openness of government bodies, and providing timely, impartial, and comprehensive information to the public about the goals, tasks, progress, and results of large-scale reforms. It also underscores the need to enhance the efficiency of information services as part of Uzbekistan's integration into the global information society. Against this background, the PR system must be viewed not merely as a tool for disseminating information or conducting political propaganda, but as an effective communication mechanism that supports two-way dialogue, public engagement, and shared decision-making. In the contemporary political setting, such an approach is vital for establishing stable and trustworthy relations between political parties and the public.

From this perspective, every political party must develop a well-considered, targeted, and systemic communication strategy to ensure the effectiveness of its activities. This strategy should encompass efficient cooperation with mass media, social networks, and civil society institutions. In the process of maintaining and reinforcing a party's public standing, the development of public relations should be recognized not merely as a primary function but as a strategically significant area requiring scientific understanding and systematic action. Studying public opinion, considering societal needs and expectations, and providing clear, transparent, and credible information in all communication processes are among the key determinants of political legitimacy, increased public trust, and stable relations with the electorate.

Overall, maintaining continuous and meaningful engagement with voters enables a political party not only to communicate during election periods but also to accompany citizens throughout long-term political development processes. This strengthens voter trust and becomes a decisive factor in ensuring broad public support for the party's future activities.

Through effective communication, political parties can achieve several positive outcomes in their work with the electorate, including:

- analyzing citizens' needs and expectations (target needs analysis),
- delivering tailored messages to segmented audiences (message targeting),
- promoting the political agenda through mass media and digital platforms (agenda-building),

In this regard, it is essential not only to disseminate information but to ensure two-way communication with voters through interactive formats—particularly by implementing effective feedback mechanisms. For example, active engagement on social media, conducting online surveys, holding live question-and-answer sessions, and using digital analytics to study voter sentiment play a significant role in guiding political decisions effectively. At the same time, for any PR campaign or branding strategy to succeed in practice, it must be grounded in regional, demographic, and cultural factors.

Political parties must also take into account the process of mediatization when shaping public opinion—that is, the way reality is presented through mass media influences public perception. From this perspective, it is vital not only to study modern methodological approaches theoretically but also to test them in practice through pilot projects and subsequently scale them up.

Furthermore, a party's mobile communication—via chatbots, mobile applications, and other digital tools—facilitates day-to-day interaction and strengthens voter trust through personalized communication channels.

Public relations within the activities of political parties is not merely the work of an "information service" or a "propaganda unit"; rather, it represents a broad and strategically significant political communication process. ineffective public relations. PR inertia refers to a communication process that becomes monotonous, standardized, and detached from dynamism, thereby losing its impact. Such a situation distances the party from its electorate, prevents accurate reflection of societal needs, and ultimately leads to increased electoral passivity.

In conclusion, the public relations system is a vital tool in ensuring effective political communication for political parties. Through PR, parties convey their ideas and objectives to the wider public, maintain dialogue with voters, and gain the ability to influence public opinion.
