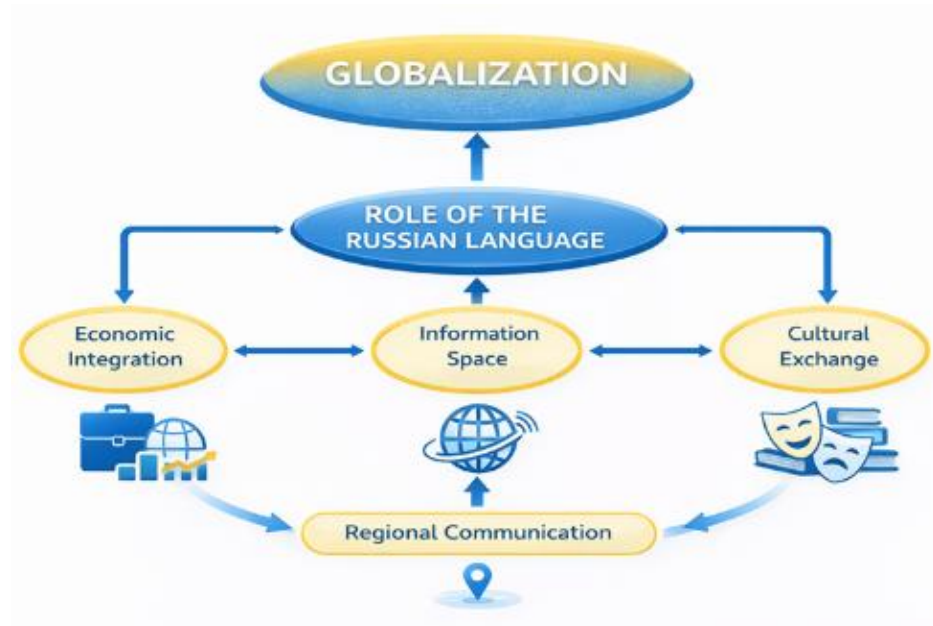


Figure 1. Globalization and the interaction of the Russian language.
