Oates “identifies administrative inefficiencies, tax evasion, and inequitable tax burdens as major obstacles to effective local revenue collection”. These issues can undermine the social legitimacy of local taxes and hinder municipalities from achieving sustainable development goals. Similarly, Bahl and Linn note that small municipalities often struggle to generate sufficient revenue due to limited tax bases, making fiscal decentralization less effective without adequate support and capacity-building programs[7].

Business license fees contribute around 20–25%, while local sales taxes and service charges account for 15–20% and 10–15%, respectively. Other minor taxes, including vehicle and tourism-related levies, contribute a smaller share of 5–10%[11].

These findings suggest that property taxation plays a critical role in ensuring long-term financial sustainability, enabling municipalities to plan and implement development projects effectively.
